So, all being well, we should have eight leaflets by the end of the year to help promote the valley and of course The Friends of the Porter Valley.

Meanwhile, the restraints of lockdown have



done little to deter Sue from producing a magnificent selection of family activity trails, which are now available to download from the FoPV website. 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Loosening Lockdown

I do hope all of you have coped well over the last four months, and as you saw from my interim news pages, our committee members have been busy getting ready for a revival of FoPV's regular activities. Regretfully we decided to cancel the August Open Meeting but we still expect to be able to run the AGM as usual at Bents Green Church hall on 4th November 2020, and keep our date with Pauline Burnett who is to speak on Abbeydale Forge. But, just in case it cannot run as usual, we shall email you the papers (annual report, accounts, minutes from 2019) and information about how to receive your essential clearance and approvals.

It was wonderful to see both the Cafes open again: Forge Dam in early June, with beaming smiles beyond a serving window and external delivery under the awning... thank goodness given the rainy days! At the time of writing FoPV plan to be there in force on 9 July ... 24 volunteers marshalled into 4 teams, each with a team leader and allocated to 4 specific locations and tasks. There is so much clearance to do everywhere in the valley after 17 weeks without any conservation work. All workdays have to be organised on a prior booking arrangement for the time being, with social distancing and small groups only.



Two of us tested the new Tuesday workday routine under Covid 19 rules: Caroline Egglestone and I wrestled with couch grass, cleavers, thistles, nettles and countless more weeds along the playground margins. It was good to don the yellow Viz jackes again and work on something beneficial to the community, even if we were two metres apart and the weeds largely defeated us. Endcliffe Park Cafe



opened on 15 June, again a beautifully orchestrated external service. Cheryl McCormick sprang into action with renewed duckfood supplies to the Endcliffe Cafe: you may smile, but it earns FoPV quite a bit , and the ducks are happy! The Porter Valley is on my doorstep and with our children and now grandchildren we have walked, cycled and enjoyed all this valley has to offer. Bingham Park away from the main cycle trail and Shepherd Wheel has a lot of hidden gems. Friends of Porter Valley have produced a leaflet "50+ things to do in a walk around Bingham Park". With the leaflet in hand I completed some of the tasks, apart from hopping across the bowling green no longer used by bowlers I decided to leave that to my grandchildren. During this period of lockdown it was interesting to discover hidden paths and really look at the magnificent trees in the park. The park has also been a haven for families and young people. The pay-to-play tennis courts are well used and the resurfaced old tennis court has been enjoyed by young children cycling and later in the day by skate boarders. Linda and Zoe, members of Bingham Park Community Group (BPCG),had arranged for children's activities in the Bowling Pavilion but it had to be cancelled due to the <u>lockdown</u>.

FoPV working groups were unable to work in the parks, and park staff have been really busy maintaining the parks for our enjoyment. The number of people in the parks especially with fine weather has created a major problem with an increase of litter. Additional litter bins have been provided but if full people dump stuff at the side of the bin. A lot of litter (plastic and glass bottles, crisp, sweet bags and quite a lot more unpleasant rubbish), never reaches the bins. Some is from young people but I have seen adults dump stuff, including dog waste, next to overflowing bins. Members of BPCG and other people have collected litter. A black bag with a number of glass bottles (some smashed up) is quite heavy. So please spread the word: enjoy Bingham Park and take your litter home.

Six months in a weird world: Late last December my wife, Pauline and I set off to London to celebrate my birthday and to go on to Bath for the Christmas celebrations. Pauline developed a cough and was bit feverish and we ended up at A&E in Christmas Eve. A chest infection was diagnosed and antibiotics prescribed. By Christmas Day I began to exhibit similar symptoms and so for six days we steered around our family to try to avoid infecting them.

When we were able, we drove home to spend the next fortnight recovering from what was probably a virus. Was it just one of those winter ones or something more sinister? As we improved we began to consider our up-coming trip to Singapore and Malaysia in February. We began to absorb the news about Covid and wondered about the wisdom of travelling. After taking advice from a Singapore resident we finally decided to go. We had a great time and were impressed by all the temperature checks at airports etc. There were very few tourists so we had the places to ourselves most of the time. On our return home we were surprised that no such checks were undertaken at Manchester but were glad that our taxi driver was there to greet us! Had we tried to leave three days later from Penang we would have been stuck there as all flights were cancelled due to a severe outbreak caused by a mass gathering of pilgrims to a local shrine. On our return in mid-March we self isolated, and soon afterwards the UK went into the Lockdown.

As regards FoPV financial affairs, the worst aspect was the cancellation of the duck race which usually nets c.£10k for the Forge Dam fund. Recently we have had a number of generous donations for which we are most grateful. Despite the lockdown I have been able to bank cheques and so my work has been reasonably unhindered. Our negotiations with the Heritage Lottery Fund are currently in abeyance as regards raising funds for the Forge Dam Project. We have been able to have a Zoom conference of the Management Committee for Shepherd Wheel.

All in all it has been quite the weirdest six months in my life, but I hope it is now improving and that our members have been able to get through it without too many problems.
