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Low water levels at Wire Mill Dam this year, the worst since my 60s childhood, have left fish gasping for air and dying. The Parks Department has installed an aerator to re-oxygenate the water but this is a temporary solution. The major cause has been the low rainfall this summer, with no water run-off from the fields to top up the water from the goit, coupled with low volume down Porter Brook.

Above Forge Dam Cafe there is a small grill through which water flows into the mill race. Any water flowing down here cannot reach Wire Mill. Sandbags have been placed over the grill by the Parks Department as a temporary measure to divert more water over the weir towards the goit entrance, instead of into the mill race. At the entrance to the head goit for Wire Mill Dam, there is a small weir to allow water to dam up and feed the goit. This is leaking. Conservation volunteers have placed sandbags in front of the weir to create a small dam, enabling water to flow into the goit.

The goit is badly silted up and in some places also leaking. The volunteers have dug out silt along the full length of the goit, but a mechanical solution is needed to de-silt it and restore full flow.

Conservation volunteers have also dug a channel to help direct water into the main Dam area. We continue to monitor the situation closely and liaise with the Parks Department to find a longer term solution. Lyndon Porter

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# **Boulsover Country**

We had a brand new walk for August devised and delivered by Sheffield Museums Interactor Chris Bullivant to discover one of the great unsung inventors of Georgian Sheffield who changed the world, Thomas Boulsover. Chris had created two walks to run over the weekend, the first being a full two hour walk starting from Thomas's home of Whitely Wood Hall and the second a slightly shorter route aimed at families with children and also suitable for those with pushchairs and mobility scooters. He came suitability attired for the occasion dressed as Thomas Bouslover himself, in fine 18th century clothes!

Although Thomas Boulsover is famous in most people's eyes for his

invention of Sheffield Plate, Chris was guick to inform us this was only a small part of his business and there was so much more to his achievements, particularly in the

Porter Valley. Thomas developed a way to roll cast steel which was used for the making of saw blades and probably built the world's first saw factory at Forge Dam. From the rolling process came the connection to shipbuilding in the city.

For the family walk, Chris brought along a bag full of homemade props to demonstrate the various industrial and manufacturing processes. A pasta roller machine with pastry was used to demonstrate the rolling of the steel for saw blades and an old butter tub with plastic gears of different sizes on a straw for an axle demonstrated how the larger diameter wheel produced greater torque, and further downstream Chris got in the Porter to demonstrate an undershot and overshot water wheel from his bag of tricks!

An altogether enjoyable as well as informative and educational couple of walks. Chris did however leave us with the controversial statement that there has not been any evidence discovered so far to support the general consensus that the building which we all refer to as the Button Factory ever made silver plated buttons there!

Bat walk: The evening of 10 September saw a select four of us with four Council officers feeling our way in the dark all round Forge Dam in order to set a "baseline" for the species at Forge Dam. Past bat walks have been public events and attracted a big crowd but this was a proper ecology exploration with hand-held kit. For obvious reasons we have no photos to show! But we recorded four types of bat: Noctules, Daubentons and Pipistrelles and some sounds on the bat meters that might have been Brandts. There will be more ecology surveys to support the case for that DEFRA Recovery grant of  $\pounds$ 247000 and it would be good to hear from any members interested in joining the ecology team.

The Chinese have theirs, ditto Hadrian and even Pink Floyd - and now FoPV Conservation Volunteers have their own - A WALL!


Under the guidance of Matt, our Park Ranger, the first task was to dismantle to ground level the temporary repairs from 2019 which were unstable. Matt taught us the basics of dry stone walling. First we were instructed to create the correct 'batter'; no, not Yorkshire pudding, pancakes or cricketers. This 'batter' refers to the angle of the wall sloping inwards towards the top. We drove steel stakes into the ground to create a slant, against which to build the face of the wall. String tied between the stakes created a horizontal line which would be the level of the top of the stones we were laying, The string was moved up the stakes as each layer was formed.

Finding the best stone to fit snugly from the many available was challenging; many had to be discarded. The space around the tree trunk was filled with rubble, willingly provided by Dave Clegg from his old patio. Finally the coping stones were mortared into place. A new flower bed has been filled with soil and the slope made ready for FoPV gardening volunteers to plant.

Hopefully our wall will last as long as Hadrian's and China's though, a sad footnote, the magnificent mature tree around which the wall has been built is now showing sign of ash die-back disease and will need to be felled within a couple of years.
